



State Leadership Teams

- Median leadership team size is 18 individuals representing 15 organizations
- Twenty states had a designated Strengthening Families coordinator in 2014, including 6 with full-time coordinators, 6 with part-time coordinators and 8 in positions that also include other responsibilities
- Just under 60% of states have parent/community representatives in the Strengthening Families leadership group at the state level
- Four most common sectors represented: Home visiting, maternal and child health, early care and education and child abuse and neglect prevention (children's trust funds and other prevention entities)
- In half of all states the following sectors are also represented:
 Advocacy, child welfare, early intervention, family support, fatherhood/healthy relationships, K-12 education, mental health, parent leadership and public health
